The Open University Deferral Policy (Microcredentials delivered on FutureLearn) (2023/2024)

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The Open University is incorporated by Royal Charter (RC 000391), an exempt charity in England & Wales and a charity registered in Scotland (SC 038302). The Open University is authorised and regulated by the Financial Conduct Authority in relation to its secondary activity of credit broking.

Summary of policy

This policy sets out:

- how you can get support, when needed, due to personal, unforeseen or uncontrolled circumstances that impact your studies and you need to apply for a deferral
- the procedure that you must undertake, should you wish to defer your Open University Microcredential

Summary of significant changes since 2022/2023 version

There are a number of changes from the previous version of this document. These are:

- The title of the document has been updated to make clear that this document applies to Learners studying a Microcredential delivered via the FutureLearn platform.
- The Student Charter Values paragraph has been reviewed and revised for conciseness.
- Wording updated in Section 2 to make clear that if a Learner applies to defer the submission of their Microcredential assignment and their application is approved, there will be no further fee payable to join the course at its next start date.
- Wording updated in Section 3 to make clear that if a Learner fails to submit their assessment and has not contacted FutureLearn to apply for a formal deferral, they will need to reregister and pay the Microcredential fee again in full if they want to repeat study of that Microcredential at a later date.
- Inclusion of a Feedback section if Learners wish to provide any feedback about the document.

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Scope

Who and which circumstances this policy covers

This policy applies to you if you are currently studying a Microcredential offered by The Open University and delivered on the FutureLearn platform starting from August 2023.

Who this policy does not cover

This policy does not apply to you if you are studying:

- a Microcredential that is delivered on the Open University's Virtual Learning Environment (VLE): please refer to <u>Conditions of Registration (Microcredentials</u> <u>hosted on the Virtual Learning Environment (VLE)</u>)
- any other modules and/or qualifications offered by The Open University.

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Introduction

The Open University wants you to be able to do your best in your Microcredential study. However, we know that sometimes events happen which mean that you cannot submit your Microcredential assessment by the deadline.

The Open University recognises that you may need to change your study plans to support your personal circumstances. The Open University is committed to helping you achieve your study goals by offering options for deferring your Microcredential assessment.

Policy

1. Purpose

This policy provides you with details on how you can apply for deferring your assessment submission on your Microcredential.

- 1.1. The objectives of this policy are:
 - 1.1.1. Inform you of the consequences for non-submission of your Microcredential assessment
 - 1.1.2. Inform you of The Open University's position on granting extensions to submission dates for your Microcredential assessment
 - 1.1.3. Inform you of the procedure for requesting a 'Microcredential Deferral'

2. Policy principles

You can apply to defer the submission of your assignment on your Microcredential offered by The Open University. If your deferral is approved, you will be registered on the next available course start date of your Microcredential. This process is called 'Microcredential Deferral'. There will be no further fee payable to join the course at its next start date.

Please see the Procedures section which provides details on how you can apply for a Microcredential Deferral.

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3. Non-submission of your microcredential assessment

If you fail to submit your assessment and do not contact FutureLearn to arrange a formal deferral, The Open University will issue you with a 'Fail: No Resit/No Resubmission' for your Microcredential result. You will not be allowed another opportunity to submit your assessment and will not be eligible to repeat study of that Microcredential without paying a further fee. Should you wish to repeat study of that Microcredential at a later date, you will need to reregister for your Microcredential on the FutureLearn platform and pay your Microcredential fee in full.

4. Microcredential Extensions

Extensions to submission dates for Microcredentials offered by The Open University are not permitted, under any circumstances.

5. Further Help

If you are still unsure what to do, or need help with your request, you should contact <u>FutureLearn Microcredential Support</u> for advice.

Procedure

You may request deferral at any point up to the last working day **before** the assessment submission deadline date for your Microcredential. Deferral requests made after the assessment submission deadline will not normally be considered.

If you are unable to submit your assessment on time and/or are unable to continue with your Microcredential, you must contact <u>FutureLearn Microcredential Support</u> and formally request a deferral.

You can only request a deferral once on each Microcredential course.

If you have enrolled onto your Microcredential through sponsorship, your deferral request may be subject to approval from your respective funding scheme or employer.

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If you have already been granted a deferral on the same Microcredential course previously, your deferral request may be rejected.

If your deferral request has been approved, you will normally be registered onto the **next available Microcredential course start date**.

If you are unable to continue your study at the next Microcredential course start date due to personal and/or extenuating circumstances, please contact <u>FutureLearn Microcredential</u> <u>Support</u>.

In the event that there are no upcoming course starts on the Microcredential you wish to defer from, please contact <u>FutureLearn Microcredential Support</u> where we will discuss your study options.

You may be asked to provide evidence to support your request for deferral. This will be discussed with you at the time of your request.

It is incorrect to assume that the assessment will not differ between course runs. It is your responsibility to ensure that you have read and understood the assessment criteria of the Microcredential you have been deferred onto, prior to the submission of your assessment.

Glossary of terms

Microcredential/Microcredential Course

This means a course studied online and consists of between 100-150 hours of study time (including the Summative Assessment) for which academic credits are awarded.

Microcredential Course Start Date/Course Run

This means the date on which teaching of a Microcredential officially begins. There may be communication or access to learning facilities via FutureLearn, before this date. You will be informed of the Microcredential Course Run when you register and/or at the time of applying for a deferral.

Microcredential Deferral

This means deferring the submission of your assignment on your Microcredential offered by The Open University to the next available course start date.

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Microcredential Learner

This means a Learner studying for a Microcredential. As a Microcredential Learner, you may also be asked to agree to other Policies and Procedures as listed within these Conditions, which refer to you as a Student.

Registration

This means the process by which you become a Student of The Open University. FutureLearn manages the registration process on behalf of The Open University. Subject to the Terms and Conditions you may register for a Microcredential.

Us/We/Our

This refers to The Open University.
